SUMMER WORK!



Dear Families,

It is essential for your child to read over the summer to actively nurture the love of reading, develop literacy skills, and be prepared for the following school year. It is important to surround students with a variety of high-quality books and help them make time for regular reading throughout the summer. Through summer reading, we hope students will continue to develop their love of reading, keep up their hard-earned skills and get to know a wide range of authors, series, and genres. Enjoyment is key! Help your child choose books they are interested in.

In addition to independent reading, parents should read aloud at least one chapter book with their child. This shared reading experience will help develop your child's vocabulary and critical thinking skills. While reading aloud, pause with your child to discuss the book. Ask your child questions, such as, "What is happening in the book?" "What is the main character's biggest problem?" "What do you think is going to happen next?" "What in the text makes you think that?" "Is there a part of the book that stands out to you and why?"

In third grade we continue to build our stamina for writing. Students will learn to take small moments and stretch them into detailed stories with action and dialogue. They will work on persuasive writing and create fantastical stories. To prepare them for this, students should continue practicing their skills and building their stamina throughout the summer. This will help them settle in our routine of 30 minutes of independent writing. Encourage your child to use the writing bingo to find prompts that interest them. The goal is to get Bingo (or more)!

When coming into third grade, it is helpful for students to have practiced their essential math skills over the summer as well. The summer math packet focuses on addition and subtraction skills, interpreting and solving number stories (word problems), and telling time, all of which are skills we reinforce in the beginning of the year. In addition, you can quiz your child on basic addition and subtraction facts so that they come automatically.
