Building common language, which we highly value at GSFS, is essential to talking about race. Students looked at many key terms, including bias, racial identity, privilege, micro-aggressions, and colorblindness. They applied and connected the terms to mini-scenarios, added vocabulary

words to the list, and generated their own scenarios.

This lesson built on the identity development strand of our Life Skills curriculum. The students did an inspiring job of talking honestly about the issues and teaching each other.
